Summary of outputs

The conference aimed to strengthen links in dementia prevention research between British and Israeli groups from a variety of professional disciplines. The meeting focussed on the interface between basic, clinical and epidemiological research and on factors and mechanisms that may promote individual brain health and prevent or delay the onset of dementia. Topics covered included population-based research, meta-analyses, neuroimaging and other biomarker studies, genetics, healthcare policy, interventional strategies, animal research and basic science. A range of relevant disorders were discussed, including Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, cerebrovascular disease and frontotemporal dementia.

Before this conference, there was a striking lack of dedicated scientific meetings in this important field, despite the significant interest of the international scientific community and the importance of dementia prevention. The conference was held jointly with the 27th Tel Aviv University Alzheimer's disease conference and attracted ~200 attendees, including leading British and Israeli scientists and policy makers and a delegation of 14 researchers from the UK (see detailed list below). The meeting was successful in creating a forum for the UK-Israel dementia research community and to enhance the effective exchange of innovative ideas between the scientists. Seven early-career researchers could present their findings (data blitz presentations) and two of them were awarded prizes for the best talks. There was ample opportunity to network during breaks, the faculty dinner on 17 June and a day trip to the Dead Sea.

Overall feedback from the UK delegates was excellent. They appreciated the opportunity to engage in discussions with their Israeli colleagues and praised the high quality of the scientific talks. They also lauded the work of the organising committee in arranging this notable meeting, which has already resulted in new connections in specific areas of research. Hosting a joint meeting with the annual Tel Aviv University Alzheimer's conference has proven very effective and we will start exploring options for a second UK-Israel conference in 2020.
